In our President's Special Project, we are going to take care of ourselves so we can take care of others. We will have a major focus on three topics:

1. Walking—According to Harvard Health, just 21 minutes a day can cut your risks of heart disease by 30%.

In addition, this do-anywhere, no-equipment activity has also been shown to reduce the risk of diabetes and cancer, lower blood pressure and cholesterol and keep you mentally sharp.

We will make walking fun...and competitive.

I am throwing out a challenge to the women of GFWC-NC. Let's walk to the moon. We can do this!

2.Wellness—Make PREVENTION your priority. There are numerous ways to stay healthy and on top of your health.

Talk to your healthcare provider to set up preventive screenings and well-woman visits.

Help others in your community get the screenings they deserve to have. Organize a mobile mammogram vehicle in your community to make early breast cancer detection accessible and convenient for all women.

3. Healthy Eating—Diets rich in fruits and vegetables may reduce the risk of some cancers and other chronic diseases.

Fruits and vegetables also provide essential vitamins and minerals, fiber and other substances that are essential for good health.

Support the food pantries and the back-pack programs in your communities so that all families can eat healthy foods.

We need to look at health and wellness as an investment, not an expense. Good health will become an expense if we do not take the time to invest in it. Our mission is not merely to survive, but to thrive and to do it while showing compassion for others.

For many years I served as a school principal. Every morning, after morning announcements were given on the public-address system to the entire school, I closed with this pledge:

I will act in such a way that I will be proud of myself, and others will be proud of me, too. I came to school to learn, and I will learn. I will have a good day. Think about that pledge – it was a daily affirmation, a way to remind students that they had a choice in how the day transpired.

We each have the same choice to make every day. A small change in the words and the pledge becomes:

I will act in such a way that I will be proud of myself, and others will be proud of me, too.

I joined GFWC of North Carolina to learn and to give of myself and I will learn and give of myself. I will do this to the best of my abilities!

The decision is ours—yours and mine. Let's say "yes" to the promise and build an even better and stronger GFWC of North Carolina.

By doing this, we "CELEBRATE WOMEN" by celebrating ourselves, celebrating the women who came before us, and celebrating those yet to be.

FACTS YOU NEED TO KNOW REGARDING OUR CORPORATE CHAMPIONS EVENT

2. Why was Charlotte, NC, selected as the place to hold the CCWC event?

As Chairman, Bev Lassiter asked the EC if she could hold the first event in Charlotte, since this was the place where she was familiar with organizations and community leaders to raise the most funds. Bev also worked with several businesses to receive "In Kind" donated work so that GFWC-NC would not have to use their funds for certain expenses, i.e. design work for Logo, Save the Date & Invitations; wine for reception & dinner; advertising in the Charlotte Observer for 2 months promoting the event and afterwards congratulating the winners; program for the event; and actual CCWC Award and engraved "stands" for the event.

3. When the 2017 CCWC winners were selected, did all the monies raised go back into the Charlotte Community?

Absolutely not. All monies raised from Corporate Partnerships, as well as individual table and ticket buyers, went directly back to GFWC-NC to strengthen our fund-







She gives at home, work community, state, and this year, even internationally. Right after Hurricane Maria, refugees from Puerto Rico arrived at the Coast Guard base in need of clothes, shoes and food, having just been rescued from their homes leaving everything behind.

Although she was recovering from knee surgery, she organized donations and meals for them. And this is just one example of her kindness.

She lovingly works as a community leader improving life by supporting the arts, preserving natural resources, advancing education, promoting healthy lifestyles, encouraging civic involvement and working toward peace and understanding. Her happy and loving nature is contagious!

Outstanding Citizenship & Patriotism Award

This clubwoman is a natural volunteer, and by all means a most patriotic, outstanding citizen. This year's winner of the Outstanding Citizenship and Patriotism Award and recipient of the Bryant Citizenship Bowl is **Trenia Marietta from the Camden Woman's Club**.

This clubwoman volunteers with many organizations, and she leads by example. She is active in the Quilts of Valor Club which makes and presents quilts to veterans. She volunteers at the local food bank, the ASPCA, and a variety of local festivals. She is very involved with activities for military families, and is a driving force when it comes to fundraising activities for scholarships for children of military families. For the last seven years she has supported a 9/11 memorial bike ride which draws about 250 police officer participants by driving her van along the route from Ground Zero to the Pentagon to assist riders who have been injured or have flat tires. She is also in charge of the pit stops and lunch stops each day of the ride.



If there was a defining moment during 2017 that proved just how much this clubwoman deserves this award, it came in the aftermath of Hurricane Maria. She received a call late in the evening from the Commanding Officer of the Coast Guard in Elizabeth City. There was a need for volunteers to comfort 40 Coast Guard families coming in on a C-130 emergency flight at 11:30 p.m., having been evacuated from Puerto Rico. These families were mostly young women, each with two or three children, and some with a family pet. They had survived Hurricane Irma which knocked out power, and then Maria which hit the island even harder. They had gone days without showers, and weeks without a hot meal. They arrived in North Carolina with little more than the clothes on their backs. This clubwoman and a few members of the local Coast Guard Spouse Club welcomed the families that night and helped transport them to a local hotel. She returned the next morning to baby sit with the children while the mothers attended a debriefing. She soon realized that the children had lots of energy, and so she coordinated a picnic for the families. She also turned to Facebook, and quickly coordinated a clothing and toiletries drive. Furthermore, this clubwoman knew she could count on her fellow clubwomen. Members donated clothes, shoes, toys and backpacks. There was a baby that was two days old when it arrived in North Carolina. She and her fellow Woman's Club members bought diapers, formula, and clothes for the baby, and the club also gave \$500 to help feed the families during their temporary stay in North Carolina.

During 2017, this clubwoman contributed to the Federation on the local, district and state level. She served as Vice-President and International Outreach chairman for her club, and was also District International Outreach chairman. She also served on the District Awards and Nominating Committees. She attended GFWC-NC state meetings, invited a speaker from Operation Smile to the State Arts Festival, and made flower pens and chocolate suckers to be sold to raise money for the Legacy Fund.

leadership events, which have been held at every meetof North Carolina, giving as members and growing in membership, achieving things within communities, clubs, and GFWC of North Carolina, impacting communities, and determining what membership means to you – the legacy. Legacy as well took on a financial *Federation* in so many different ways, and I think impact with a goal of raising \$125,000 during the administration for the Legacy Fund.

During this transition phase, in the 2016-2017 **more** in transition. fiscal year, substantial funds were budgeted to come from the legacy fund to balance the budget, which important things. The first, from our Collect, "Let us would then reduce the amount IN that fund at the same time we were fundraising FOR it. With those indicators, significant fundraising efforts were utilized in the 2016-2017 fiscal year, with Fundraising in 2017 to instead preserve the legacy fund by increasing fundraising efforts. In 2016-2017, **\$42,218.32** was raised for the Operating Budget.

In 2017, the Inaugural Corporate Champions for Women and Children was held, again a shift in GFWC of North Carolina endeavors to recognize corporations that assist women and children, just like GFWC of North Carolina. Through the work of this committee, \$62,174.22 was raised and placed in the Corporate Champions for Women and Children's Fund, with policies and procedures put in place and expenses from this fund approved by the Executive Committee and Board of Trustees. These funds were raised from corporations and donations.

Fundraising for this fiscal year of 2017-2018 has also been held per the budget, however with the dues increase and budget passed, of a significant reduction in fundraising. However, due to sales of the GFWC-NC bracelet, the silent auction at the Fall Conference, and the Africa Trip, \$7,110.77 has been raised to date for the current fiscal year.

The Legacy Fund... an investment account for GFWC of North Carolina, had the goal of raising \$125,000 for this administration. In the past, this account supplemented operating costs for a balanced budget, so it was our intent to raise money for this account, balance the budget, and decrease or eliminate the use of the investment funds. With a goal of \$125,000 for this fund for the 2016-2018 administration, due to fundraisers, donations, and incredible support, the Legacy Fund has raised \$143,679.99 since May 1, 2016 for this account for the future of GFWC of North Carolina.

As we placed an emphasis on GFWC of North Carolina with a Focus on Federation...Building our Legacy, I am pleased to announce that not only did we accomplish our goal of \$125,000 for the Legacy Fund,

ing for various areas in the Federation. Areas supported by these funds include promotional areas to strengthen the GFWC-NC name across the state, various scholarship funds, LEADS, women & children's projects, etc. which benefit ALL GFWC-NC Districts. NO MONIES go to ANY of the winning Honorees.

4. How were the 2018 Honorees selected?

The CCWC Committee and a task force were asked to send in suggestions for corporations and/or businesses on a large, medium and small scale to Chairman Bev Lassiter by a deadline. In keeping with the criteria of NOT recognizing non-profit organizations, of the business names provided, most were non-profits and were ineligible. Following additional research to ensure that the Honorees represented a cross-section of businesses working and volunteering across North Carolina and NOT only Charlotte, the chairman was responsible for the final selections with input from the Committee and Officers.

5.Why is this event continuing to stay in Charlotte, NC?

After the first successful CCWC event, the Chairman met with key leadership in the community about moving specific fundraising events to different cities in NC. Several organizations that have similar events such as Junior Achievement tried to move their event from city to city and in doing so, lost the name recognition they were looking for statewide. This caused them to make less money than continuing to hold it the same time each year in the same city. Because of all the "In Kind" donations from area businesses that are continuing to support this event in its 2nd year, and with the fact that we have past Corporate Partnerships returning to support our event, the increase in name recognition for GFWC-NC is HUGE.

6. Why is it so important that corporations and businesses know GFWC-NC?

Because as we become more well known for recognizing Corporations and/or Businesses who do so much for Women's & Children's issues and we honor them, our name becomes synonymous with this ONLY award in North Carolina. For us to discontinue the event allows other women's organizations to take this from us and use as their own.

7. Why does GFWC-NC need this fundraising event?

Due to GFWC-NC's financial situation at the conclusion of the April 2016 Convention, large-scale fundraising was considered a significant need, and one that MUST take place in order for our Federation to survive. Coupled with the 2016-2018 President's Special Project of raising monies for our Federation and the Dues increase passing at the 2017 annual convention, we are now able to use these monies without taking them from other investment areas. We have succeeded in our goal!

8. Exactly how much money was raised at the first event in 2017?

Nearly \$100,000.00 was raised through individual ticket buyers, individual donations, Table Sponsors and Corporate Partnerships and after expenses a total of **\$67,174.22** was invested back into GFWC-NC, which benefits ALL of our members in North Carolina.

9. Who exactly attended the event?

The event in 2017 was attended by many generous club-women from across NC as well as area corporations and businesses that purchased large tables, solicited by the CCWC Chairman.

10. How can other businesses, large, medium or small, be included for the CCWC Committee to potentially select for 2019?

Any clubwoman within GFWC-NC's nine Districts is welcome to send in names of corporations/businesses (NOT NON-PROFITS) and their contact information as well as what they do in the area of volunteer community support to the CCWC Chairman Bev Lassiter @ bevlassiter59@gmail.com.

The CCWC Chairman and Committee would WEL-COME help and support from Districts 1 through 9 and NEED your input. This event is for ALL GFWC-NC Clubwomen, our Federation and the projects and events that WE support.

11. When is the CCWC Event this year?

The 2018 event will be held on September 13, 2018, at The Ritz Carlton, Charlotte, NC. The event will begin at 6:00 p.m. with a Reception: the Banquet and Awards begin promptly at 7:00 p.m. and the evening's activities are complete by 8:30 p.m. An incredible video was produced in conjunction with our in-kind partner WhirlWind Creative and will be available for viewing at our annual convention in Cary, NC, in April of this year. Several pictures from the event are included with this article. Save the Dates will go out in the next few months and it will be on our GFWC-NC website at that time. We are all encouraged to attend, support, volunteer and be a part of this statewide fundraising event. Area hotels will be available if one wants to spend the night. The attire for the event is BUSINESS.

Lucy Bramlette Patterson Award & Scholarship for Excellence in Creative Writing

The Lucy Bramlette Patterson recognitions are given in memory of Mrs. J. Lindsey Patterson (Lucy), the first President of NCFWC (1902-1905). Mrs. Patterson was not only the first NC Federation of Women's Club President but a true literary advocate. She is remembered for her annual award for literary achievement in the state, the Patterson Memorial Cup which was presented from 1905 until 1933 by the North Carolina State Literary and Historical Association. This award was a massive loving cup set with forty-nine precious stones from North Carolina mines. It was retired to the North Carolina Museum of History. It was replaced with the Mayflower Society Cup which was retired in 2002 and replaced by the Ragan Old North State Award Cup.


